

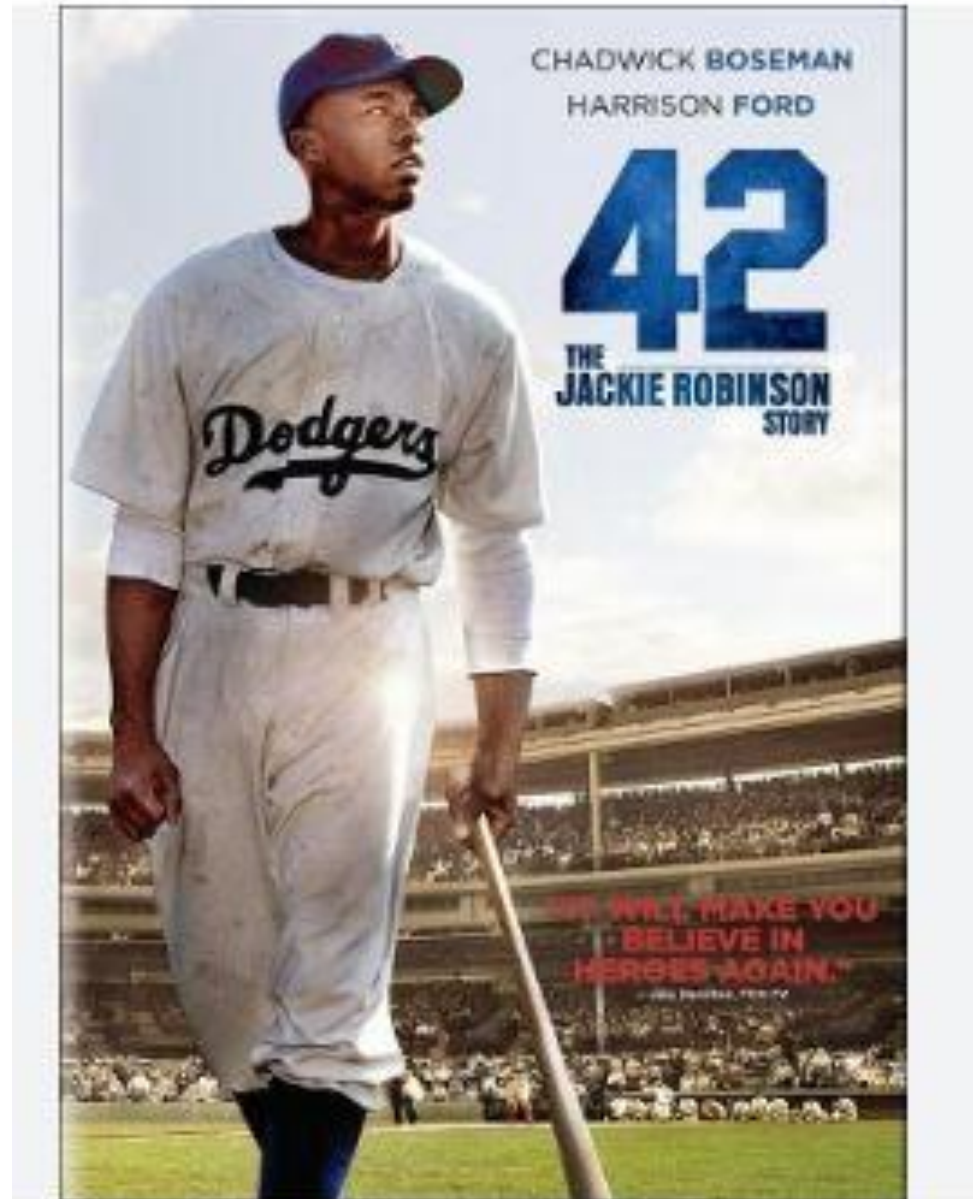

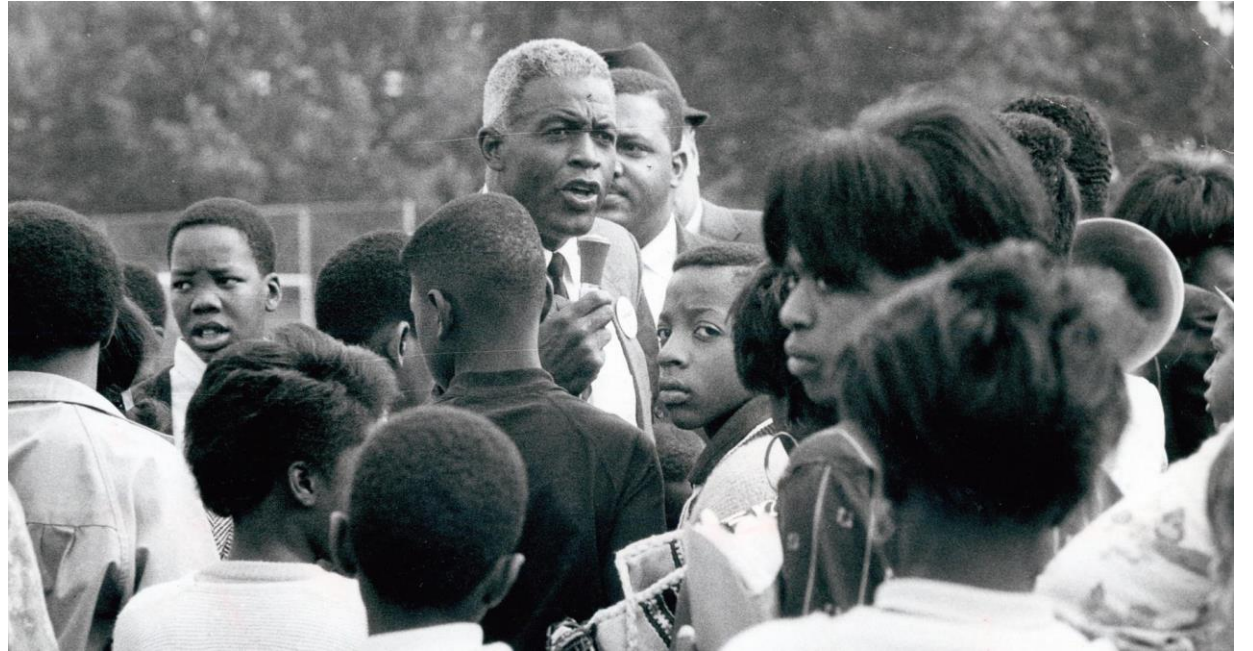


Why Jackie Moved on From Baseball.

- Jackie “broke up” with the Dodgers and baseball itself.
- Why?
- Dodgers traded him to the Giants in 1957
 - Jackie retired from the game.
- Things Jackie never did –
 - No old timers’ games
 - No baseball card shows
- His involvement in politics and civil rights movement.
- Had a difficult life – even after baseball.
- Excellent Book – “I Never Had it Made.” – his memoir.

Jackie dies in October, 1972

- Died at 53 years old
 - Two weeks after appearing at 1972 World Series.
 - Complications due to diabetes and heart disease.
 - His work was unfinished.
- His teammate Gil Hodges died
 - April, 1972
 - 47 years old.
 - Mets Manager in 1969
 - Mets win the World Series.

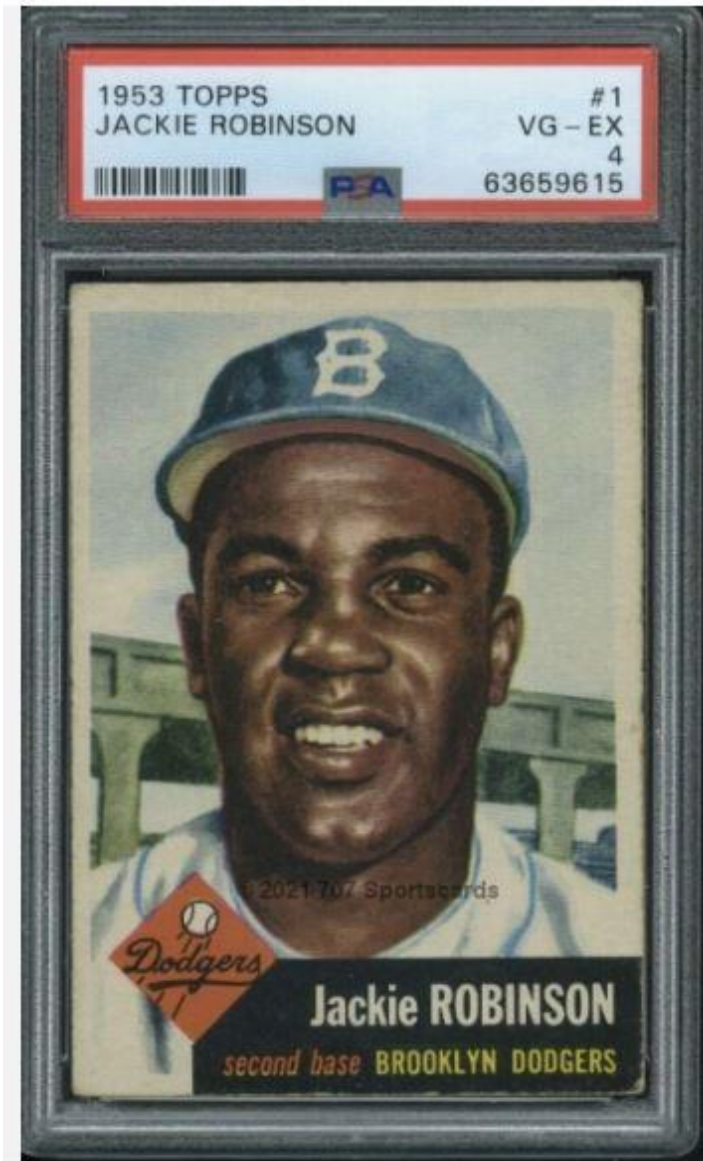


How I became interested in this topic..

Main Points

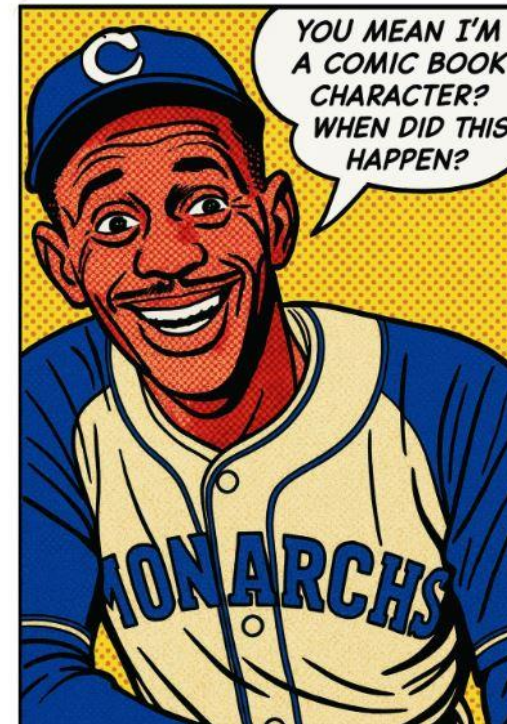
- The story of Jackie Robinson and the Brooklyn Dodgers has been told many times.

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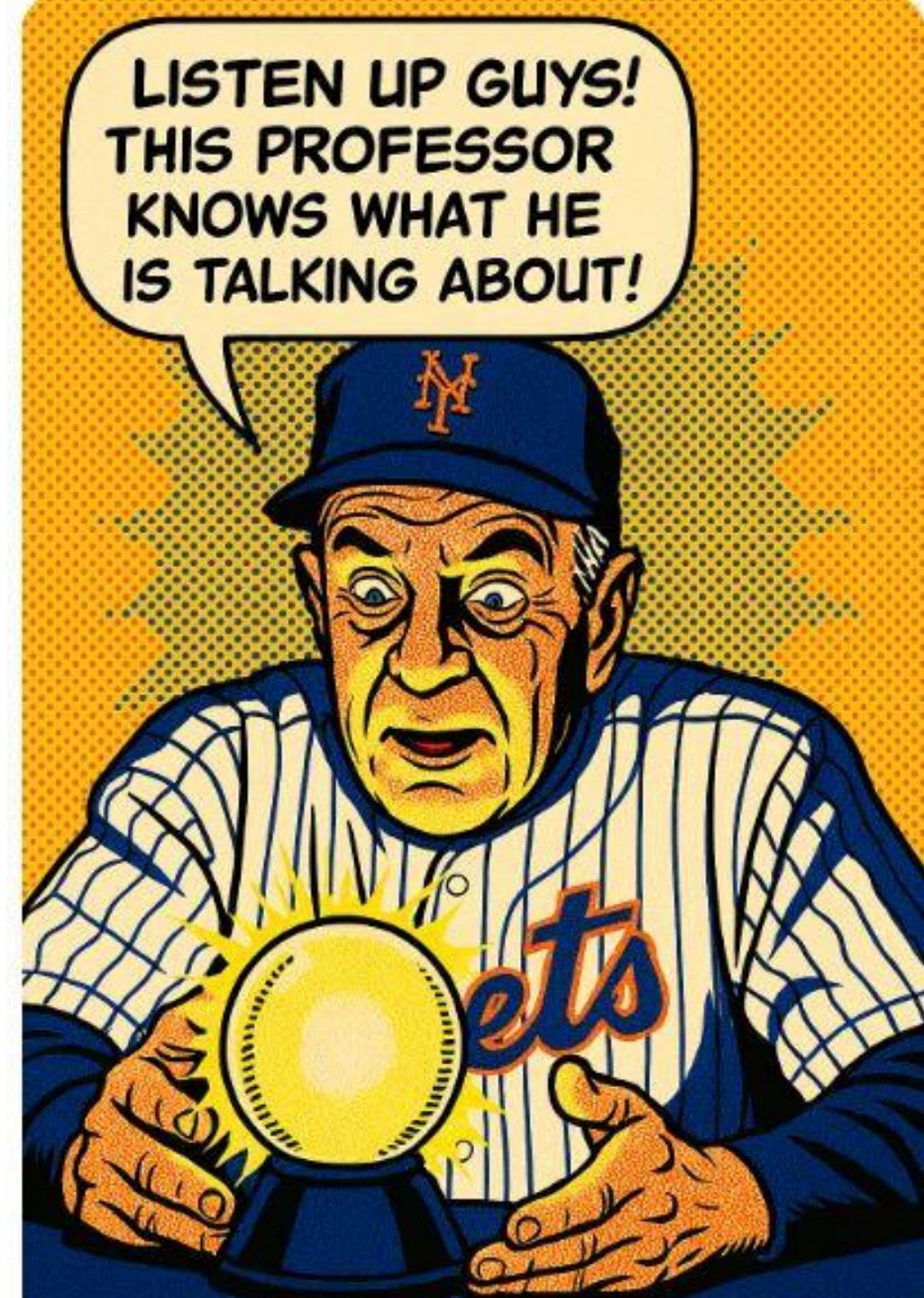

 - The greatest catch of all time?

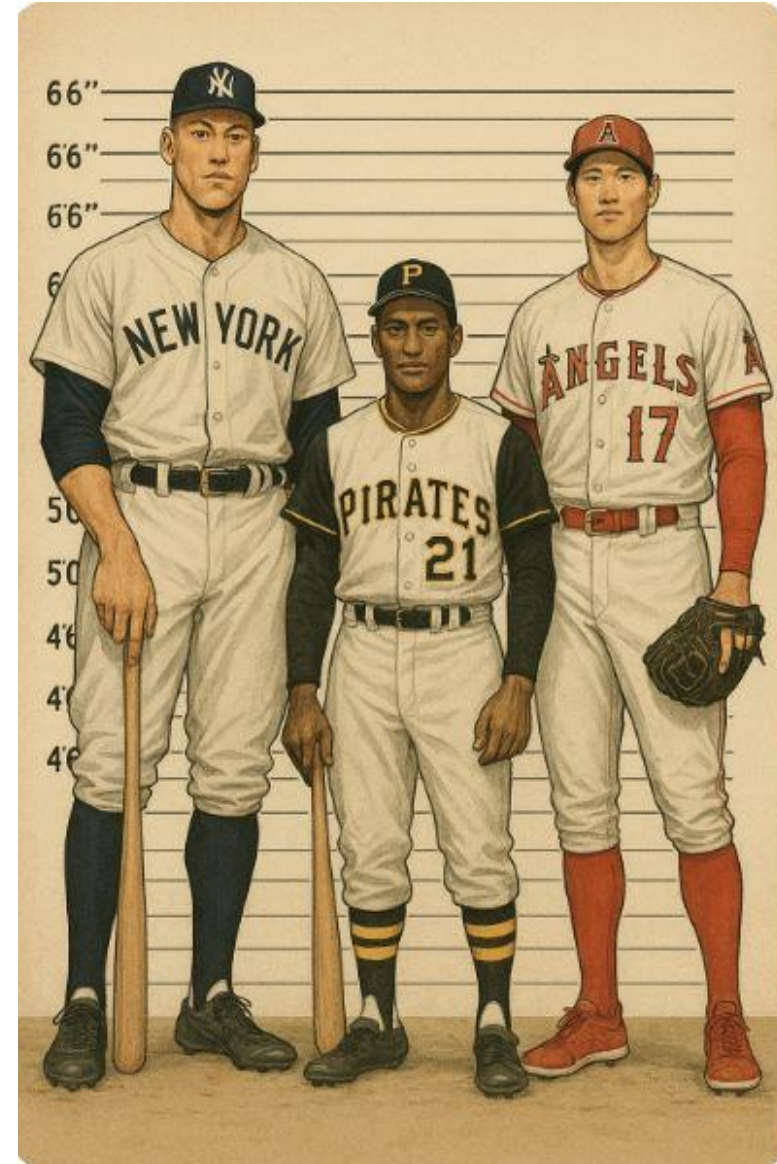

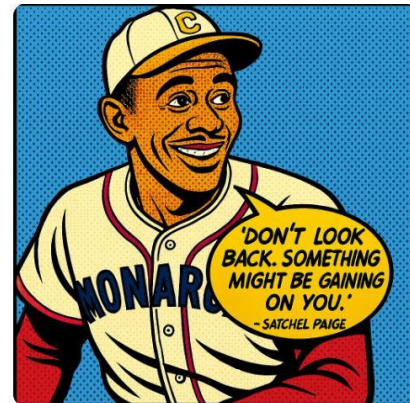

Looking Back

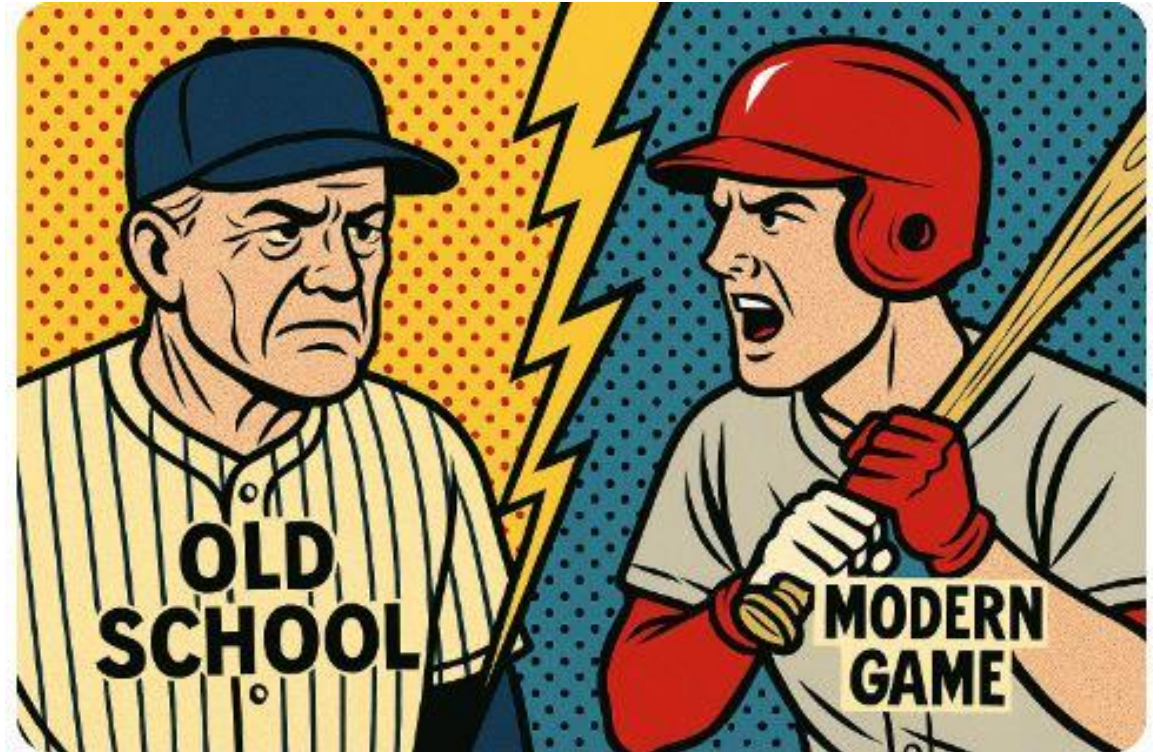
- Integration of Baseball was inevitable

Thought Experiment

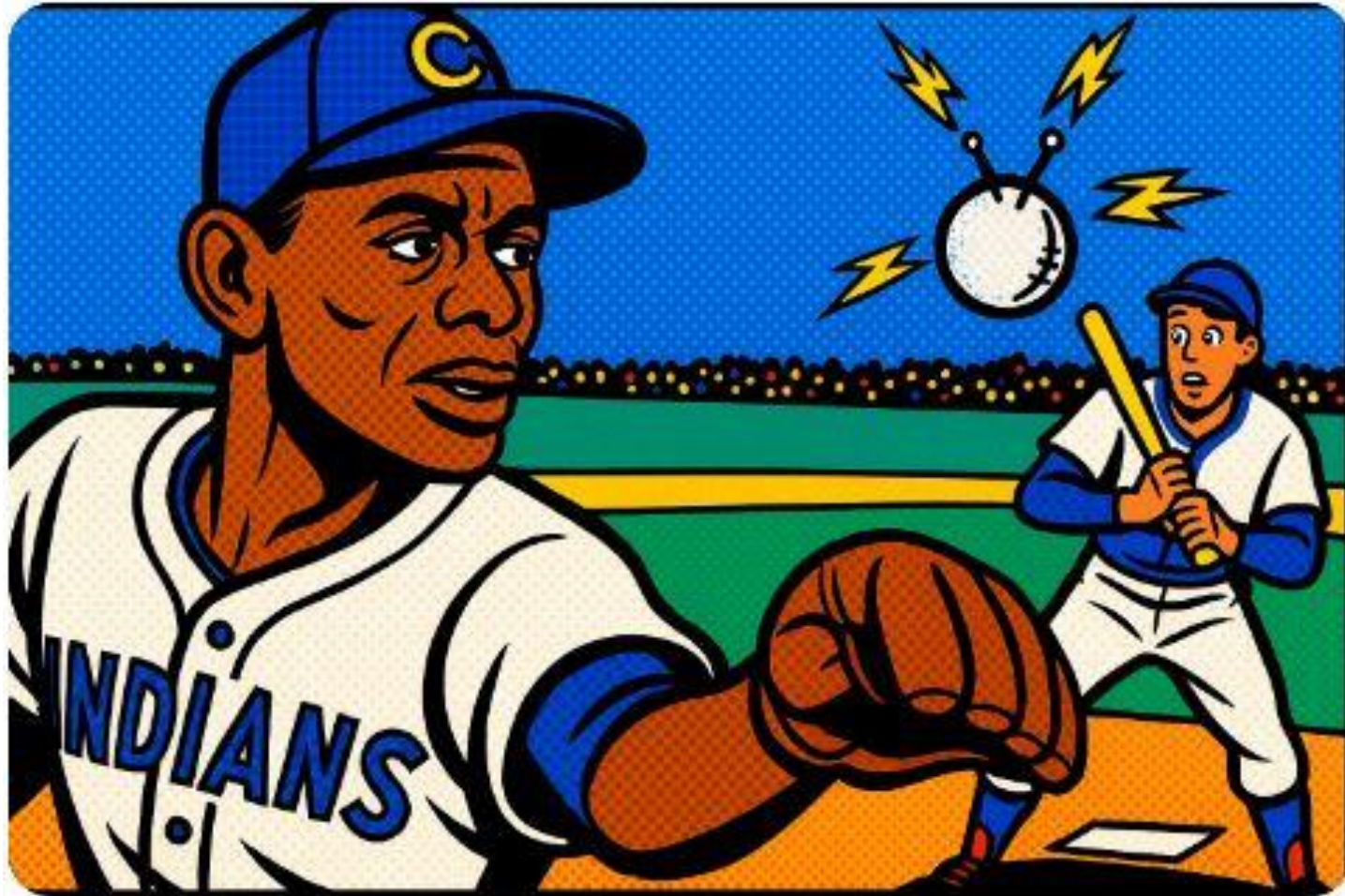

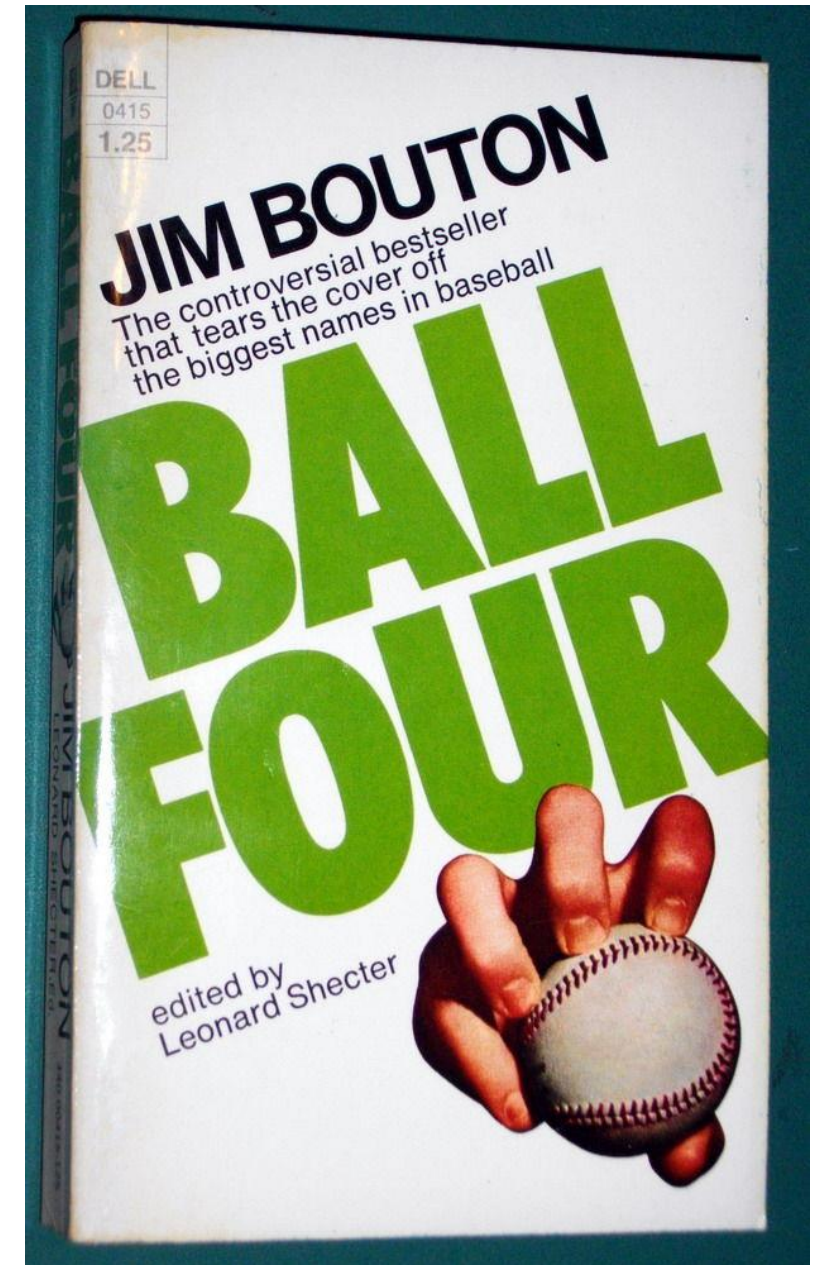

Baseball Memoir

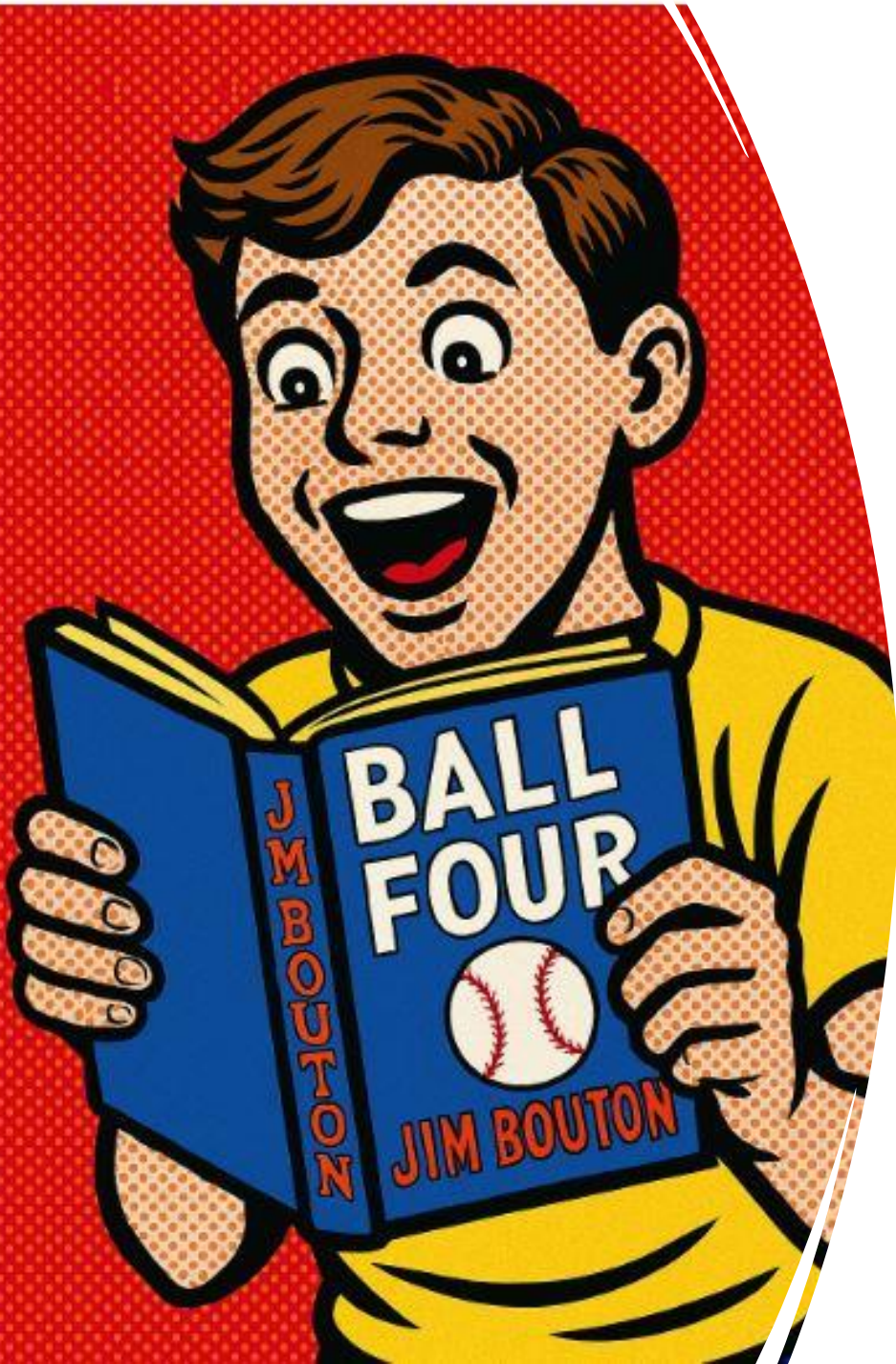
- Jim Bouton's Ball Four..
 - Published in 1970
 - Cause a huge uproar!
 - Considered one of the greatest sports books of all time.
 - Sold 5.5 million copies.
- Some Deep Questions
 - What is the meaning of happiness?
 - How can you be a “good person” in a complex world?
 - Critics said –
 - Bouton violated the “sanctity of the locker room”
 - What if his teammates did not want to be written about?



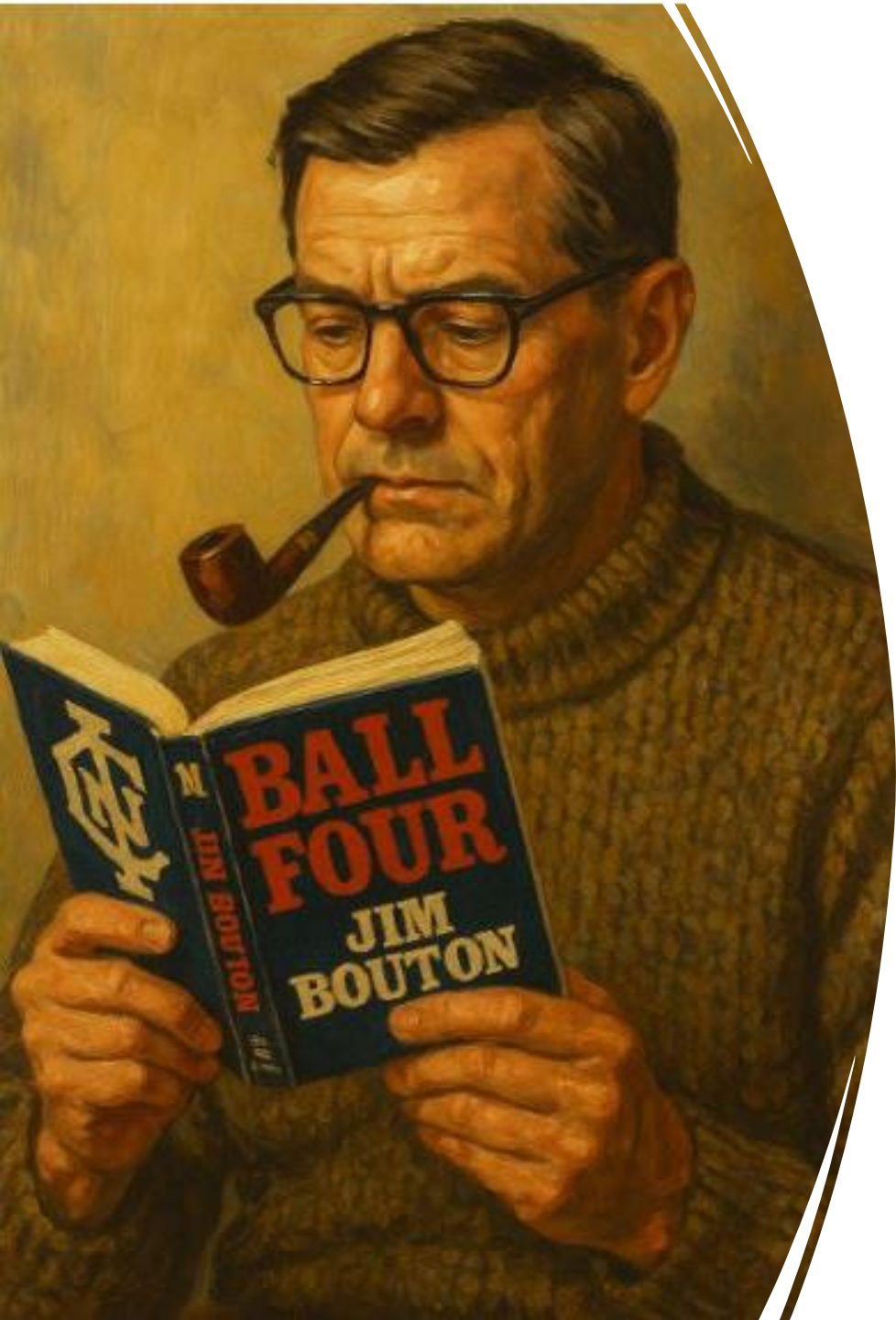
Jim Bouton

- A man ahead of his time..
- He dragged baseball

 - It’s about the impact your life has on others.

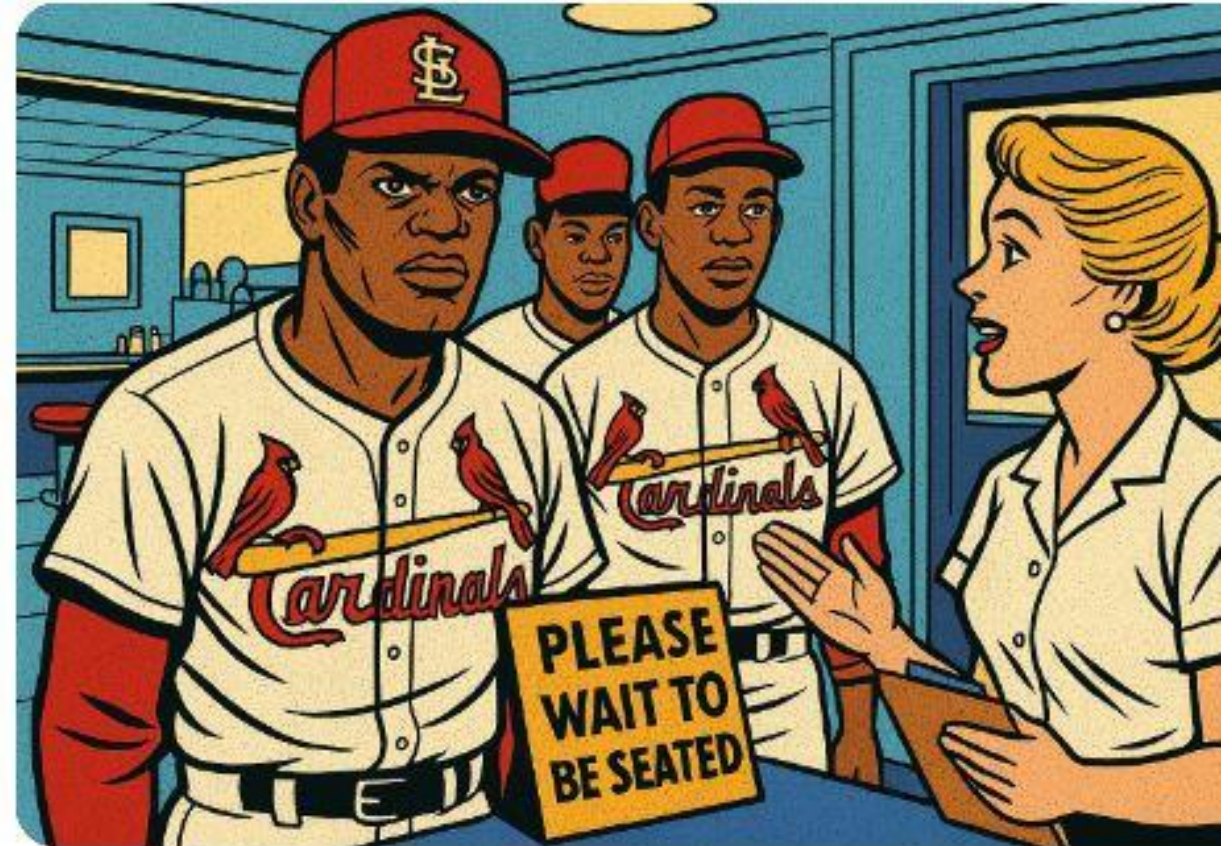
Historical Airbrushing...

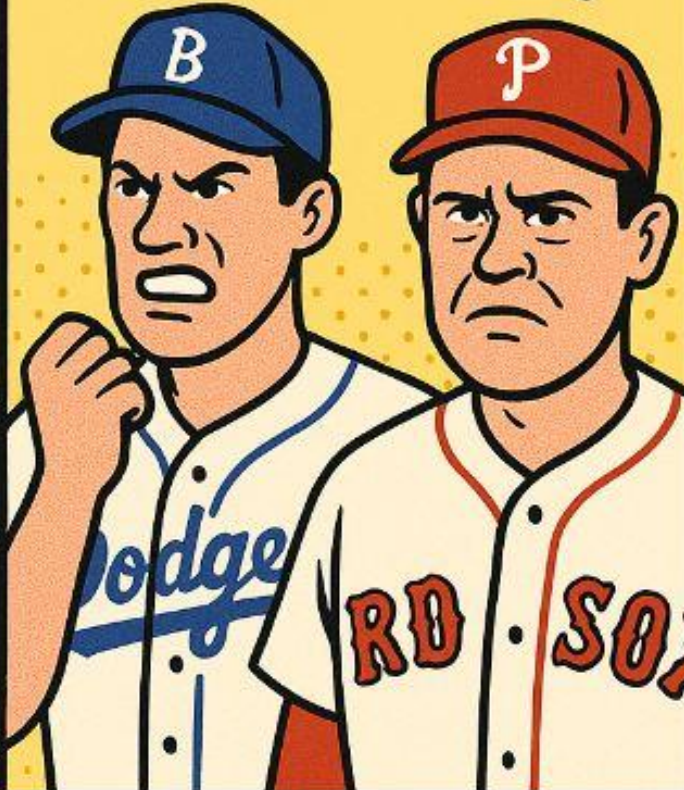

Myths and Misconceptions

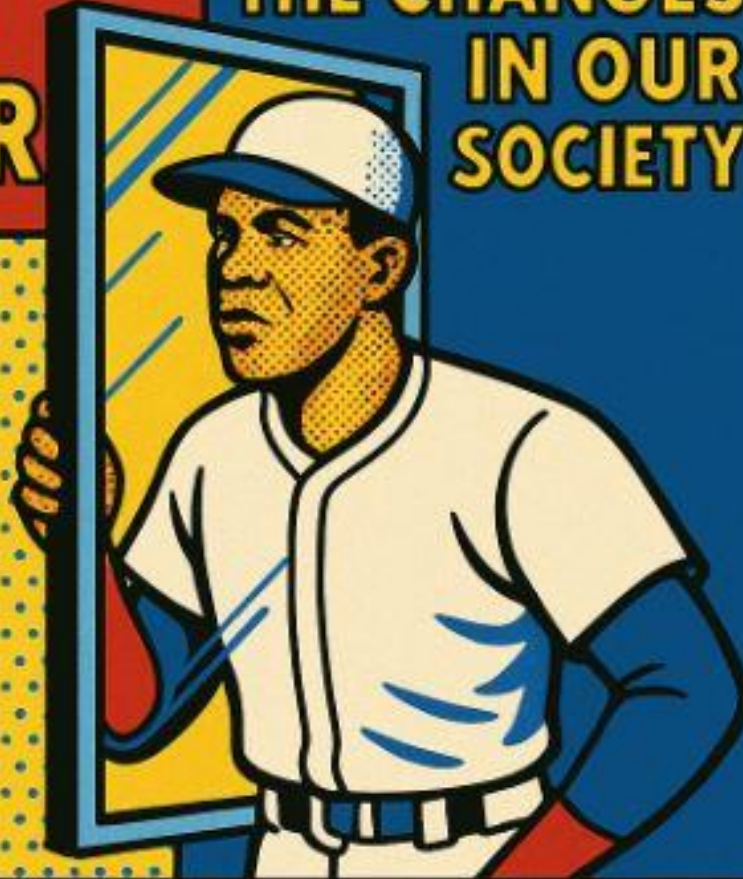
- Myth # 1: The myth of “heroes and villains.”
 - Heroes: Jackie Robinson, Branch Rickey
 - Villains: Dodger teammates who resisted, Phillies manager Ben Chapman
- Myth # 2: Racial prejudice was confined to certain regions of the country.
 - That is, The South.
- Myth # 3: Jackie Robinson believed in “turning the other cheek.”

What happened in the early 1970s?

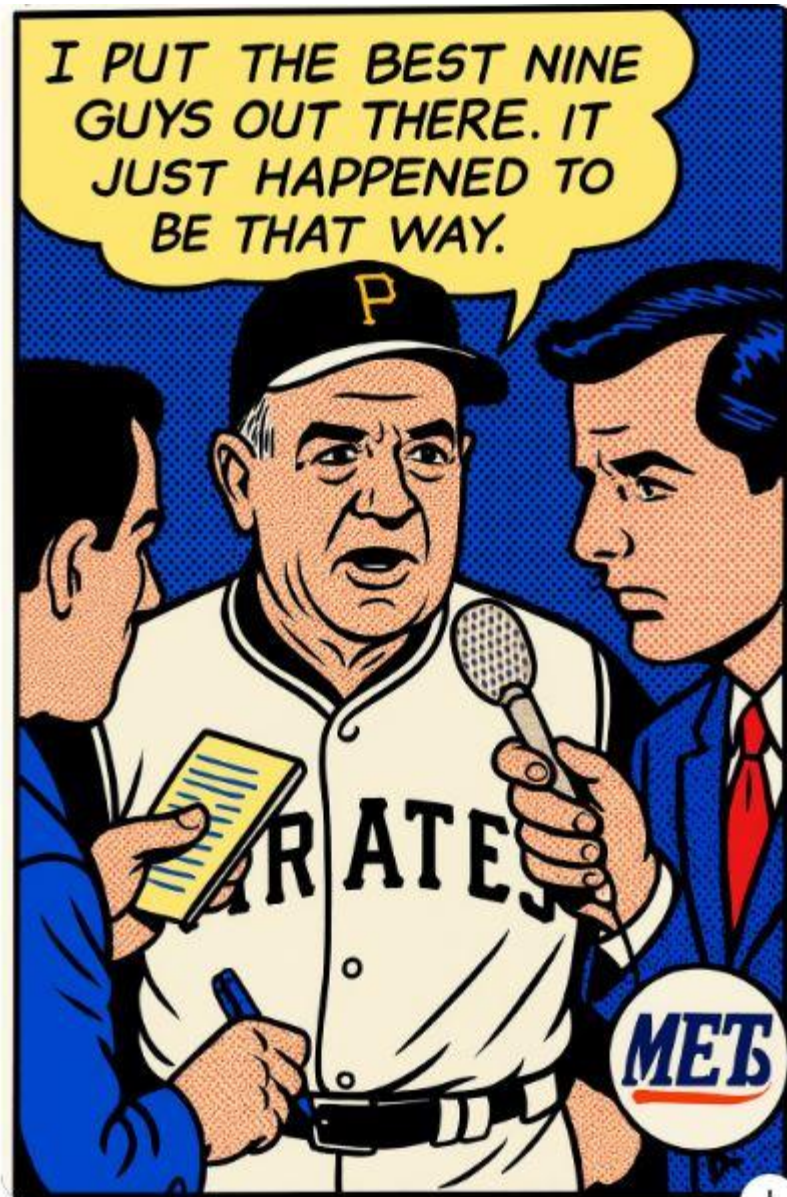
- First amateur draft happened in 1965
- 1971 – Pittsburgh Pirates – 9 Black players start a game.
- Curt Flood lawsuit - 1972
- 1974 – Baseball's first free agent Jim Catfish Hunter.
- 1973 – American League adopts the designated hitter..
 - What does this have to do with racial integration?
- 1975 – Frank Robinson becomes first black manager.

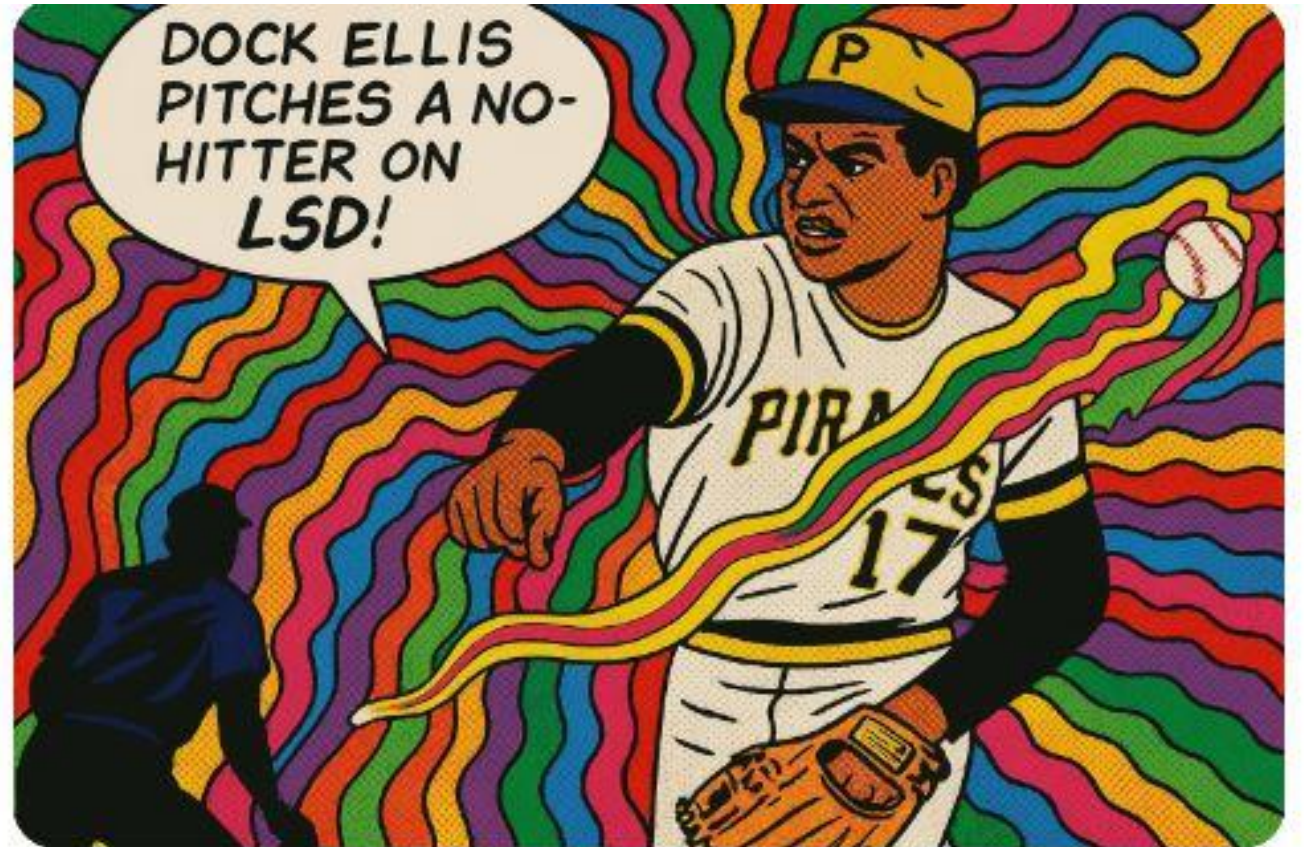
