Member Portal

- Sign in to the **Member Portal** (<u>olli.unt.edu/members</u>) and click the **Categories** menu option on the top right corner of your screen.
- Select the **Videos** category and then click the **Add to Cart** button beneath the video lecture you'd like to watch.
 - You will then be taken to your cart. If you need to continue adding videos, click your internet browser's back button to return to the previous page and continue adding videos to your cart.
- Once you have added all of your desired videos to your cart, complete the check out process. No payment will be required. When you've finished, the Member Portal will display a message letting you know that your order has been completed.
- You will receive instructions on how to access each video in a confirmation email.

OLLI AT UNT VIDEO LECTURES SUMMER 2020

The following video lectures are being made available exclusively to OLLI at UNT members.

Introduction to the World's Longest History Lesson

In this lecture, Dr. Andrew Torget explains how and why he set a Guinness World Record in 2018 for the World's Longest History Lesson. Dr. Torget's record-breaking lesson lasted 26.5 hours, covered Texas History from prehistory through the Great Depression, and ultimately helped support The Portal to Texas History. This lecture serves as a primer for those who want to watch all or part of the World's Longest History lesson on The Portal to Texas History.

Dr. Andrew Torget is a historian of 19th century North America at UNT, where he directs a digital humanities lab. A veteran of pioneering work in digital scholarship, he has been a featured speaker at Harvard, Stanford, Rice, Duke, Johns Hopkins, and the Library of Congress. His book, *Seeds of Empire*, won twelve major book prizes and was hailed by by *Texas Monthly* as "the most nuanced and authoritative rewriting of the Texas origin myth to date."

Vexillology: Texas Style

Vexillology is the scientific study of the history, symbolism, and usage of flags or, by extension, any interest in flags in general. What do you know about our Lone Star Flag? Enjoy this lecture and learn a few new facts about what makes her special.

Professor Emeritus Diana Mason holds a Ph.D. in Science Education with the emphasis in chemistry. She taught chemistry for 33 years until her retirement from UNT in 2012. In 2016, she was commissioned by Governor Abbott as an Admiral in the Texas Navy, recognizing her passion for the great state of Texas.

Maintaining & Improving Your Mental Skills As You Age

This video lecture focuses on the aging of our mental skills, the complex picture of growth and decline and the reasons for such changes. Specific recommendations and techniques for maintaining and improving one's mental skills as persons grow older are provided.

Dr. Bert Hayslip, Jr. received his doctorate in Experimental/Developmental Psychology from the University of Akron in 1975. He was on the UNT faculty from 1978 to 2013, where he is now Regents Professor Emeritus. He has taught Psychology of Aging, Life Span Developmental Psychology, and Death and Dying at UNT as well as many courses relevant to lifelong learning for OLLI at UNT.

Improving Your Memory: How To Remember Not To Forget

This lecture will enable members to understand the ways in which we understand memory in later life. The lecture explores the many influences on memory and enable members to learn new skills to improve your memory.

Child Abuse: The Problem & The Response

From the US Gymnastics Team to the Catholic Church, it seems like reports of child sexual abuse have skyrocketed lately. Watch this lecture to learn the dynamics of abuse: who is committing these crimes, how do they do it, and what can we do to stop it?

Kristen Howell, LMSW, is the Chief Executive Officer of the Children's Advocacy Center of Denton County. Kristen has worked in the field of social work and family violence for the last 23 years. She graduated from Baylor University with a Bachelor's in Social Work and the University of North Carolina with her MSW.

Detective Joe Adcock is a nationally recognized child crimes expert who works in the Flower Mound Police Department.

International Relations and the Coronavirus Pandemic

This video lecture focuses on the challenges in coordinating an international response to the COVID-19 pandemic and explores the consequences of the pandemic for international relations.

Dr. Michael Greig is a Professor of Political Science at UNT with a primary research and teaching expertise in international relations. His work explores the forces that cause the outbreak of conflict and the tools that are most effective in transitioning war to a stable peace.

F is for Forgery: Art Crime at SMU's Meadows Museum of Art

When billionaire Algur Meadows, founder of the Meadows Museum of Art, decided to collect art, he did so with much enthusiasm, but with no experience in art collecting. His new affection for art attracted some unsavory characters from the world of art crime that were keen to exploit Mr. Meadows' fortunes. Learn how Mr. Meadows came to own a spectacular collection of forgeries created by Elmyr de Hory, a renowned art criminal who has been called "the greatest forger of our time."

Dr. Laura Evans is an Associate Professor of Art History and Art Education and the Coordinator of the Art Museum Education Certificate at UNT. Evans has interned or worked at galleries across the world.

Missing: Goya's Duke of Wellington & da Vinci's The Mona Lisa

In 1961, Francisco Goya's famed portrait of the Duke of Wellington was stolen from Britain's National Gallery. It was a scandal that rocked and enthralled the country. Uncover the mysterious motives of the art thief, how British law was changed due to the heist of the *Duke*, and why James Bond is connected to the *Duke of Wellington*. Then dive into the theft of *The Mona Lisa* from the Louvre in 1911 and discover what connects these two infamous thefts of art.

Your Family History:Thinking About Different Ways To Share Your History

Family history is the story of the lives of family members and their relationships. With the advent of the Internet, you now have the option of producing your family history in multiple ways, i.e., blogs, websites, videos, and Facebook, to name a few. This video lecture will introduce you to a variety of family history stories and provide you some the key elements you need to consider when writing.

Dr. Emily C. Richardson worked in higher education for 30 years as an administrator and a tenured faculty member, before retiring in December 2018 to follow her genealogy passion and open her genealogy business, Kinsearchers. She has done genealogy research for over 40 years and has taught this topic to college students, adult learners and in two other lifelong learning institutes.

Resilience: Your Most Important Muscle

This lecture on resilience is based on research and studies proving that our personal and professional resilience is an intentional habit that directly affects our feelings of fulfillment, gratitude, and grit. The lecture includes strategies on shifting our focus to serving others, deliberately placing our stressors into proper perspective, and clearing the mental fog to power forward through times of personal and national turbulence.

Mercedes Ramirez Johnson narrowly survived a commercial airplane crash in 1995 that killed 160 people, including her parents. She presents her proprietary Second Chance Living concept, an innovative mindset and approach with a proven track record, to organizations such as General Electric, ExxonMobil, Microsoft, NASA, Chevron, and the various branches of the US Armed Forces. Mercedes and her story have been the subject of considerable national and international media coverage.

Protecting Your Good Name: Identity Theft

In this lecture, UNT Police Community Relations Officer Causey discusses what identity theft is, what to look for, and ways to protect yourself.

Officer David Causey is the Community Relations Officer for the UNT Police Department. He has been with the Department for 8 years (7 years on patrol). He is a graduate of UNT, Certified TCOLE instructor, a certified Gracie Survival Instructor, and a Field Training Officer.

Understanding the Partisan Divide

In this video lecture, members will learn about the Graves Theory of human psychosocial development, and explore how it applies to them and their interactions with their families, friends, and our society in general. The objective will be to better understand the strong divisions we see in our country today.

Rick Thomas has been a university professor, a manager with the IBM Corporation, and a Life Coach. He enjoys helping others in their quest to better understand themselves and the world we live in.

UNTold Stories: Capturing Your Memories Through Audio & Video

What better way to ensure your memories last a lifetime than by capturing them using audio and video? In this video lecture, you will learn the basics of telling a compelling story and how to record your story using simple audio and video tools. You will then have the option to upload your recording to UNT's UNTold Stories project, the StoryCorps audio library, or both.

Erin Cristales currently serves as a Communications Strategist for UNT's Division of University Brand Strategies and Communications. She is a Certified Journalism Educator who previously taught multimedia storytelling strategies in Red Oak and Denton ISDs and worked for newspapers including the *Abilene Reporter-News* and *The Dallas Morning News*.

St. Patrick's Day Celebrations: Beyond Parades, Music, and Pubs

A religious holiday to honor St. Patrick, who introduced Christianity to Ireland in the fifth century, St. Patrick's Day has evolved into celebrations and recognition of things Irish worldwide but especially in the United States. For example, since the 1950s, the Irish Taoiseach (Prime Minister) annually visits the White House and ceremoniously presents shamrocks to the president on Paddy's Day. Events related to the ceremony played a major role in the Northern Ireland peace process in the 1990s.

Rudy Ray Seward is a descendant from Mary Davis born on Christmas Day in 1792 in County Tyrone, Ireland. He first visited Ireland in 1971 and in 1998 was Research Fellow at National University of Ireland, Galway. In 2012, he was designated Professor Emeritus at UNT after 39 years on faculty. He has authored a book, book chapters, and journal articles dealing with family issues, including Irish families, fathers, demographic history, and work/family balance.

Discovering Afrofuturism

Following the 2018 release of the Marvel superhero movie *Black Panther*, interest in the somewhat obscure realm of Afrofuturism skyrocketed. Learn about the history of this artistic movement (including its surprising connection to Martin Luther King, Jr.) and explore examples ranging from *Star Trek* to the mysterious space jazz of Sun Ra.

Jordan Williams received his Bachelor's degree in Creative Writing and Master's degree in Literature, both from UNT. His writing has appeared in *American Microreviews & Interviews* and the *Tulsa Voice*.

The Mysterious & Secret World of the Dark/Deep Web

The layers of the Internet go far beyond the surface content that many can easily access in their daily searches. The other content is that of the Deep Web, content that has not been indexed by traditional search engines such as Google. The furthest corners of the Deep Web, segments known as the Dark Web, contain content that has been intentionally concealed. The Dark Web may be used for legitimate purposes as well as to conceal criminal or otherwise malicious activities. This lecture will give members a basic understanding of the Dark Web and what is on it.

Dr. Scott Belshaw is the director of the UNT Cyber Forensics Lab, where his goal is to connect with as many police departments and federal agencies as possible to accelerate investigation processes.

America after the Cold War: The First 30 Years




